HEAD COACH



A native of Toa Baja, Puerto Rico, Concepcion spent the last year as an assistant coach at University of Evansville. He assisted the club jump from a seventh place finish in 2007 to reaching the Missouri Valley Conference tournament in 2008. In his year at Evansville, Concepcion was also part of the team that upset national powerhouses Missouri State and Northern lowa.

Prior to his stint at Evansville, Concepcion was the head coach at Colby Community College, a NJCAA Division I school in Kansas. At just 25 years of age, he was the youngest head coach in the history of the Kansas Jayhawk Conference.

Before his coaching career, Concepcion played college volleyball at the University of Puerto Rico-Mayaguez before transferring to Concordia College in New York. In 2002, he was drafted by the San Sebastian Caribes of the Puerto Rico Professional Superior League. He was a member of the Puerto Rico Youth National Team in 1998-1999 that played at international tournaments held in Venezuela and Dominican Republic and also played club with three primary Puerto Rican clubs:

Club Vagueros, Club Torrimar, & Club Arsel.

Concepcion's extensive coaching career began when he founded the Island's Best Volleyball Club in Puerto Rico at the age of 21 and soon after became its president. In 2004, he became the assistant coach for the men's volleyball team at the University of Puerto Rico-Mayaguez before being named the head coach of the semi-professional team Vega Baja in the Puerto Rican League at the age of 22.

Concepcion received his Bachelor of Arts degree in organizational management and leadership from Ashford University in San Diego, California. He is certified in all three national coaching levels given by the Volleyball Federation of Puerto Rico and completed the international coaching certification given by the International Volleyball Federation which allows him to coach in any part of the world.

Josh Wielebnicki Assistant Coach First Season

Josh Wielebnicki begins his first season as an assistant coach for Western Carolina University.

Wielebnicki comes to Western Carolina from Illinois State University where he served as a student assistant. Last spring with the Redbirds, he primarily worked with outside hitters and defensive specialists as well as helped prepare practice plans. During the Fall Season, he was the Data Volley Specialist, which allowed him to be in charge of all the game-breaking activities and scouting reports. The team advanced to the Semi-Finals of the Missouri Valley Conference.

A 2008 graduate of Illinois State with a bachelor's degree in History and minor in coaching, Wielebnicki also played club volleyball for Illinois State. He served as the Vice President and co-captain for the team.

Wielebnicki was also the Head Coach of the Illini Elite Volleyball club preparing elite players, 16-to-18-years old, for the collegiate level. He helped the players develop skills from a fundamental, tactical, and technical standpoint.

Prior to transferring to Illinois State, Wielebnicki spent two seasons as an outside hitter/defensive specialist/libero for Lewis University.



Emily Martin Athletic Trainer, Third Season

Emily Martin begins her third season as the athletic trainer for the Western Carolina University volleyball team. She also works with the

Catamount softball team.

Martin received her master's degree in sport psychology from UNC Greensboro and while working in her master's degree she worked as an athletic trainer for men's soccer

and baseball at Greensboro College. In the fall of 2004, Martin was an athletic trainer for the volleyballl team at North Carolina A&T.

She earned her bachelor's degree in athletic training at State University of New York at Cortland in 2004.



Denise Gideon Director of Media Relations Third Season

Denise Gideon begins her third season as the Director of Media Relations at Western Carolina University. Her primary duties are with volleyball, women's basketball, softball, women's tennis, and will also assist with football.

In her first full year at Western Carolina, Gideon began the Catamount Tracks podcast, becoming the coordinator of the podcast and also initiated the Catamount Student-Athlete Roundtable podcast, recruiting the help of women's basketball players Heather Swayne and Jessica Jackson as hosts. She also initiated the Catamount Student-Athlete Blog site and also has had numerous student-athletes contribute to the NCAA blog site Double-A Zone. She has also taken on the role of social media director, initiating the Catamount Twitter site and updating it's contents.

Gideon also helped bring a national spotlight to Western Carolina University, as she served as a liaison between ESPN.com writer Graham Hayes and Catamount softball player Lauren Ross. In July of 2008, Hayes wrote a feature story, which ran in the ESPN U section of ESPN.com, on Ross and her balancing playing softball and her musical talents. Ross became the first Catamount in school history to be featured on ESPN.com. She again brought the national spotlight on Western Carolina in the March of 2009 when she alerted Hayes on "the play" that all but secured the Lady Catamount basketball team the 2009 Southern Conference Tournament crown, who wrote a blog about the unusual play.

Gideon joined the Catamount staff after spending time as an assistant media relations director at Middle Tennessee. Her primary duties with the Blue Raiders were volleyball, women's basketball, women's tennis and softball.

She was directly responsible for the initial publicity of Blue Raider women's basket-ball player Chrissy Givens, who ended her storied four-year career as an All-American at Middle Tennessee. Gideon also assisted Givens in writing a blog for the NCAA sponsored website Double-A Zone.

Also while at Middle Tennessee, Gideon was the liaison for numerous blog postings by Middle Tennessee student-athletes on the Double-A Zone. Most notably was softball player Shelby Stiner, who was the first and only full-time blogger for the Double-A Zone and was also one of the inaugural members of the Lowe's Senior Class Award nominees for softball.

Gideon is a graduate of the University of Tennessee with a B.S. in communications and a B.S. in education with a concentration in sports management. She received her master's degree at UT in sport administration.

Gideon is the host of a syndicated podcast about One Tree Hill. She is also the podcast host and producer for actress Hilarie Burton's (who played Peyton Sawyer for six years on One Tree Hill) Southern Gothic Productions.

High School



Played in 80 games and started 29 matches ... Notched a career-high 10 kills twice ... Had a career-high seven digs against Ole Miss (Aug. 25).



Q&A WITH MANUEL "MANOLO" CONCEPCION

Since this is your first stint as a head coach, first let's talk about your excitement of starting the season.

"This is the moment that I have been waiting for since I started my coaching career. Seeing the players develop and cope with change is very inspiring; especially since they were hungry for a new beginning. I feel fortunate to be leading the efforts of this group of girls. They seem to understand the value of hard work and what it would take to be as competitive as we want to be. We know that it will take time to reach our ultimate goals, so what we have in our minds is to focus on moving forward by being a little better than the day before; small steps will get us to the big objective."

What type of playing philosophy you have brought to Catamount volleyball?

"Simplicity, technicality, and 'international spice'; we are teaching our players the scientific side of the game. We feel that by understanding the purpose behind of what they do, they become better decision makers; it is all about becoming students of the game. The technical factor is a priority because we believe in perfection; and by this we mean getting the most out of each of their skills. The international spice refers to implementing a similar style of game that I used in Puerto Rico: very fast and aggressive."

You have three experienced seniors in Liz Rondone, Katie Hennessey and Amanda Kerr. Will you be looking to them for their leadership and play?

"I expect them to serve as mentors for the rest of the squad. I expect them to play with more passion than anyone else, and serve as an example for their teammates and future Catamounts. Liz's emotional stability and colossal court coverage makes everyone else's job easier in the defensive aspect of the game. Katie's privileged hands and court vision play a big role on us being able to run the offense as fast as we want to run it. Amanda's incredible versatility will come in handy, since she is capable of filling any position needed. I am confident that they will lead the way."

Talk about your rising sophomores who started last season: Rebecca Stoltz, Brittany Lysik and Carrie Minogue.

"Brittany is a highly skilled athlete with the capability of wearing many hats for us. She has the serve-receive ability of a libero, as well as the blocking talent of an outside hitter. Rebecca has risen to be player with superb volleyball sense. Her quickness on the middle will be a key for our aspirations. She is by far the player in best physical shape. Carrie is a self-control machine that will provide

consistency to our game; her quiet leadership is already a huge contribution on our team development."

Let's talk a bit about your first recruiting class. Can you introduce them and what they bring?

"We were fortunate to find these kinds of potentials in such a short period of time. As soon as I got here, I knew that we needed someone with experience, in order to guide this squad through the toughest moments. That's the main reason of why we recruited outside hitter Paloma Alvarez, a former Puerto Rico Junior National Team player that not only comes with international experience, but also with an NJCAA National Championship under her belt. She is a program changer. Then, we went and got two right sides: Amanda Chaparro and Abbey Scroggins. Chaparro is Puerto Rico High School Champion that brings offensive power and winning tradition to our roster. Her natural strength is her best quality. She will be seeing time on both the right side and outside hitter positions. As for Abbey, she is an exceptional talent that has the capability of being a very special player. This lefty, crafty hitter is one of those players that compensate their height with "playing tall"."

Talk about your schedule. You spend the first two weeks of the season on the road at tournaments. And also the last two weeks of September away. Is that going to be a challenge for the team?

"The pre-season schedule is designed to be the most challenging period for our team. We want them to face national caliber opponents in order to be ready for the regular season. It is important for us to learn how to react to adversity. We would like to be playing our best volleyball when it really counts. There is nothing more difficult than playing on the road; particularly for so long. When we get back home, we will be as prepared as we can be in order to play under any circumstance. We just need to focus our efforts on the things that we can control and adapt to the given scenarios."

What are your goals for this season and the team? How and what do you need to do to achieve them?

"Our foremost goal this year is to become the team that we are capable of being. This group is not intimidated by anyone. They were looking for a chance to achieve greatness, and they will have that opportunity this year. For us, that means playing with no mental barriers, knowing that we have nothing to lose, and a lot to gain. It is uncertain how far this journey will take us, but we are sure that there is a new mindset established which is realizing that the future is in our hands and now is the time to rebuild and construct - time to achieve."

VOLLEYBALL HISTORY

Western Carolina University, a trendsetter for the state and region in women's athletics, has enjoyed a tradition of excellence for more than four decades with its various women's sports.

In no sport is this more evident than volleyball, in which WCU is credited for fielding the first intercollegiate team in the state of North Carolina. Since WCU Hall of Famer Betty Peele organized the first volleyball squad in 1963, Western has continued to strive for success in women's athletics.

Peele's 1963 volleyball team was not only the state's first in that sport, but was also the school's first organized women's team in any sport at the intercollegiate level. Peele went on to introduce and coach tennis, field hockey, softball, and golf at Western Carolina. Her success with, and development of, the Catamount volleyball team alone is a story in itself.

The first volleyball team saw competition in 1963 in the form of "play-days" at different campus sites throughout the region. The sport was sponsored through the school's health and physical education department during its first 10 years and became an officially recognized intercollegiate athletic team under the auspices of the department of athletics in 1973. Peele, who coached the team for 18 seasons, led her 1972 and 1973 teams to state championships at the first two North Carolina Athletic Intercollegiate Association of Women (AIAW) tournaments. She repeated that accomplishment with another state title in 1980.

The 1982 season marked the start of a new era in Western volleyball in several ways, most notably as Peele passed the reigns of her Catamounts over to Trish Howell, who had served as Peele's assistant the previous two seasons. The '82 season was also the program's first as a NCAA Division I member.

The Southern Conference, in which WCU already com-

peted in men's sports, began testing the waters in women's volleyball by sponsoring a pilot championship tournament in 1982 and Howell led her first team to a second-place showing in that event. She would return with a team in 1983 that would win the first official Southern Conference Volleyball Championship Tournament, thus becoming the first WCU team to win a Southern Conference championship in any sport outright. In addition, Howell was named Southern Conference Volleyball Coach of the Year in 1983 to become the first woman to ever receive such a conference award and the first conference volleyball coach to be so honored. It would be the first of three such awards for her during her 12-year tenure as she garnered the recognition again in 1985 and '89.

As if the rivalry between the two mountain schools needed more fuel,

Appalachian State played a major role in the fate of Catamount volleyball teams in the mid-80's. Howell's 1984 squad lost to the Mountaineers in a heart-stopping, five-game affair, but returned to steal the thunder in 1985 in one of the league's most exciting finals ever. Western Carolina, led by such talent as Emily Holliday (1982-85), Donna Smith (1984-87), Crystal Sullivan (1983-86), and Michelle Barrett (1983-86) — whome all earned all-conference honors at least once during their WCU careers — won a see-saw battle in front of a hometown crowd in Boone in five games to cap a 27-4 season.

Western's 1986 squad was the most recent to win the


tournament, as the Cats downed ASU again after sharing the regular season crown with the Mountaineers. Western also earned a co-championship in regular season play in the 1989 season.

In 1990, Western Carolina was honored with its firstever — and to date, only — Southern Conference Player of the Year honor. Regina Brown (1987-90) was tabbed as the best overall player in the conference that season.


The mid-1990s marked the return to the spotlight for Catamount volleyball as head coach Michelle Hansen led Western to the Southern Conference championship match in both 1997 — her first year at the helm — and 1998. Despite dropping both finals matches to Chattanooga, the on-court performance set the stage for a successful decade. Western and Hansen tallied four-consecutive 20-win seasons from 1998-2001, the most for the program since securing 21 victories in 1992. Off the court, Western also experienced unprecedented success. Ramsey Herron (1996-99) was a two-time GTE Academic All-America second team selection in both 1998 and '99.

In the late 1990s, Christy Attebery (1998-2001) found her way to Western North Carolina and very rapidly found her way into the Catamount record books. Attebery holds the distinction as WCU's all-time leader in kills, ranking as the only Catamount to every eclipse the 2,000-career kill barrier finishing with 2,109 to still hold the record today. The only three-time All-SoCon performer in the school's history, Attebery also ranks atop the charts for career digs (1,682) and ranks second in career aces (159), while also holding three of the top 10 single-season records for kills.

The Catamounts continued the 20-plus victory seasons, making it five-in-a-row under first-year head coach, and Western Carolina alum, Angell Kirkpatrick Benson, with 22




In 1990, Regina Brown became the first Catamount to win the Southern Conference Player of the Year award. Brown played one year of women's basketball, and ranks third on the single-season blocks and seventh on the career swats list with 64 during her one season in 1992.

In April of 2005, Western introduced Stephanie Dragan as its seventh different head coach all-time. During her first season, the Catamounts ended a five-year drought in SoCon tournament play, winning for the first-time since the 2000 season.

The Western Carolina Athletics Hall of Fame is graced by six former volleyball players and/or coaches including Brown, Nora Lynn Finch (1967-70), Judy Green (1980-84), Holliday, Robyn Keeler Livesay (1980-84), and Peele.

Western Carolina has also become a model in academics as 71 Catamount volleyball players have been named to the Southern Conference Academic Honor Roll over the past 13 seasons. WCU volleyball student-athletes have been awarded Academic All-America honors on five occasions. Also, for the three-consecutive years from 2001-03, the team was honored by the American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) by receiving the AVCA/Molton Team Academic Award for having one of the highest team grade point averages (GPA) in the nation. For the 2002-03 academic year, the WCU volleyball team finished in a five-way tie for 26th among all Division I schools with a 3.32 GPA.



The award is named in honor of the 1998 receipient, former UNC Greensboro freshman of the year Rayna Taylor who passed away in February of 2000. Thaut led the '03 Catamounts with 445 kills.

wins in the 2002 campaign. Benson, who played for Western from 1989-92, is the only former player to have returned to her alma mater to lead the program, coaching from 2002 through the 2004 season. History was again made in 2003 under Benson's tuteledge. Kellyn Thaut became the first Western Carolina volleyball player to be named the Rayna Taylor Freshman of the Year. Thaut led the Cats' with 445 kills during her freshman campaign, adding 368 digs, 43 total blocks, and 36 service aces to earn the 15-year old award.

The Caperience



Western Carolina University, a regional comprehensive university within the University of North Carolina system, is located on 589 acres in a picturesque valley between the Blue Ridge and Great Smoky Mountains in southwestern North Carolina. Western offers career-focused education through nationally accredited programs, as well as abundant opportunities for research and recreation in the nearby mountains.

Western's student enrollment, including 9,000 undergraduate, graduate and online students, is at an all-time high. The university attracts students from across North Carolina and the United States, and from around the world, with special emphasis on serving the people of Western North Carolina. As a major public resource, Western engages with the region by assisting individuals and agencies through the expertise of its students, faculty and staff. With a student-faculty ratio of 16-to-1, Western Carolina continues its long tradition of offering small class sizes and personal attention from its outstanding faculty. The university offers more than 120 majors and areas of concentration for undergraduates, and graduate students may choose from 51 areas of study at the master's level, as well as pursue doctoral studies in education.





CAMPUS RECREATION CENTER






The newest addition to the Western Carolina University campus is the new \$13.5 million recreation center adjacent to Reid Gymnasium.

Opened in the Fall of 2008, the 73,000-square-foot recreation center includes two multipurpose courts; a climbing wall which opens to a glass roof that provides 360-degree views of the WCU campus; a 9,800-square-foot area for strength training and cardiovascular equipment; a three-lane indoor track; a 2,500-square-foot group exercise studio; fitness assessment rooms; locker rooms and administrative offices.









Dr. John W. Bardo

Western Carolina University Chancellor



During his 13 years as Western Carolina University's chancellor, Dr. John W. Bardo has propelled Western into the national spotlight as a university that is preparing students to face the challenges of the 21st century.

Since becoming the 10th chief executive officer in Western's history, Dr. Bardo has been a driving force in the University's growing status across North Carolina and the nation as a leader in the application of the tools of technology to teaching and learning. During his decade of leadership, student enrollment has soared 21.8 percent, the

average SAT scores of entering freshmen have risen by 62 points and student retention rates are higher than ever.

At Dr. Bardo's suggestion, the university community agreed to require incoming freshmen to have networkable computers, and in 1997 Western became the first institution in the University of North Carolina system to adopt that requirement, and is now moving to increase wireless networking capabilities on campus.

Similarly, it was at Dr. Bardo's urging that Western established a residential Honors College, the first in the UNC system. The Honors College, which began in 1997 with about 70 students, now enrolls more than 900 high-achieving students who welcome the challenge of advanced academic classes and competition for national and international scholarships. More recently, Dr. Bardo has emphasized the importance of service learning, which encourages faculty and staff to incorporate service to the community in many forms as a part of students' academic experiences at Western.

A native of Cincinnati, Ohio, Dr. Bardo also has engineered a university wide effort to "raise the bar" of academic standards at Western. Faculty members have increased their expectations of student performance, and students are rising to meet those expectations. That emphasis on increased academic quality is earning the attention of some of North Carolina's brightest young scholars, increasing the number of National Merit finalists and high school valedictorians interested in Western.

Under Dr. Bardo's leadership, the university has increasingly turned its attention toward reaching out to the citizens of Western North Carolina and promoting economic development as a means of improving the quality of life for the area's residents. Western's new \$8 million Center for Applied Technology is designed to address critical labor force issues facing the region by providing educational programs that will support emerging high-tech, "new economy" industries. Recently developed programs include undergraduate and graduate degrees in entrepreneurship, a degree in construction management, and approval for joint programs in electrical and computer engineering with Charlotte.

In addition, the university has formed strategic partnerships with several regional universities in the fields of biotechnology, bioinformatics and micro-optics. As construction is completed on Western's new "signature" building, a \$30 million Fine and Performing Arts Center, the university has taken numerous steps to boost heritage and cultural tourism in the mountain region, including the establishment of a new performance series of music and art.

Prior to his appointment at WCU, Dr. Bardo had been vice president for academic affairs at Bridgewater State College in Massachusetts since 1990. He assumed the dual role of provost of the public institution in 1993. Like Western Carolina, Bridgewater State was



founded in the 19th century as a normal school for the training of teachers and today is a state-supported regional, comprehensive institution.

Before moving to Massachusetts, Dr. Bardo held senior administrative posts at the University of North Florida in Jacksonville, serving as assistant to the president for planning and as provost and vice president for academic affairs. A sociologist, he had previously accumulated a decade of teaching and administrative experience at Southwest Texas State University and Wichita State University.

Dr. Bardo graduated from the University of Cincinnati in 1970 with a degree in economics. He holds a master's degree in sociology from Ohio University, and earned a doctorate in the field from The Ohio State University. A graduate of the Institute for Educational Management at Harvard University, he also has been a Fulbright Visiting Scholar at Monash University in Australia and a guest visiting professor at the University College of Wales at Swansea.

He has written extensively and lectured widely on urban and community sociology, higher education, organizational behavior, economic development, quantitative methods, and the educational applications of technology.

Dr. Bardo is currently serving a four-term term of service on the NCAA's Minority Opportunities and Interests Committee. The 12-member committee is charged with conducting reviews of issues related to the interests of ethnic minority student-athletes, NCAA minority programs and NCAA policies that affect ethnic minorities.

In fall 2004, Dr. Bardo was appointed to serve one year as chairman of the committee on economic and work force development for the American Association of State Colleges and Universities. The committee, composed of presidents and chancellors of AASCU member institutions, is one of six established by the association's board of directors to advance its work in the arena of public higher education.

Dr. Bardo and his wife, Deborah, have one son, Christopher.

ATHLETIC DIRETOR

Chip Smith Western Carolina University Director of Athletics



Western Carolina Chancellor Dr. John W. Bardo announced on August 23, 2004 the selection of Chip Smith as the Catamounts' Director of Athletics.

His first year on the job at Western was an eventful one as Western's football team won the Old Mountain Jug with a 30-27 victory over Appalachian State in the fall of 2004, the Lady Catamount basketball team won the 2005 Southern Conference tournament championship and the WCU soccer team won the 2005 SoCon tournament title.

In the spring, Western hosted the 2005 SoCon Outdoor Track & Field Championships, which was lauded for its organization and atmosphere.

In 2006-07 under Smith's watch, Western won the Women's Golf Tournament, a share of the Women's Basketball regular season title, Men's Outdoor Track & Field Championship, and a share of the Baseball regular season title before garnering an at large bid to the NCAA Field of 64, advancing to the Chapel Hill Regional Final.

Most recently, the men's golf team garnered its first-ever, at-large bid to the NCAA Championship tournament while the track & field teams took three of the four titles.

In addition to overseeing the start of a new program (softball and the construction of the program's new stadium), Smith laid the foundation for the success of three sports, hiring head coaches for men's basketball, volleyball and soccer during 2005. A review of Western Carolina's 2005-06 athletic year shows that foundation was solid. In addition to winning Southern Conference championships in soccer, men's indoor track & field, men's outdoor track & field and softball, Western played for a share of the SoCon title in football, falling to eventual national champion Appalachian State in the final regularseason game, and the Catamount baseball team was the only school in the nation to have non-conference road wins over two 2006 College World Series teams (Clemson and Georgia). WCU student-athletes earned a league-best 118 All-SoCon honors on the field, not including numerous SoCon academic honors and four SoCon Coach of the Year selections. Off the field, in addition to accumulating 1,537 hours of community service, Catamount student-athletes have posted a cumulative Grade Point Average (GPA) of 3.01 for their careers.

Smith came to Western after two years as athletics director at Morehead State. He additionally was director of athletics at Eastern Kentucky University, as well as holding positions in the athletics departments at Virginia Military Institute, UNC Charlotte and University of North Carolina.

A native of Greensboro who grew up in Siler City, Smith earned his bachelor's degree in education at North Carolina in 1978, where he played football for four years under legendary coach Bill Dooley. He earned his master's degree in athletics administration at North Carolina in 1989.

He began his career in athletics as a high school teacher and coach, first at Hickory High School and then at Garinger High School in Charlotte. He worked as ticket manager for the Durham Bulls baseball club before joining the Educational Foundation Inc., at North Carolina in 1983 as assistant to the executive director of the athletics fund-raising organization also known as the Rams Club.

Smith was a member of the athletics department administration at UNC



Charlotte from 1984 though 1991, first as business and ticket manager, then as assistant athletic director for development. He joined the staff of Southern Conference member VMI in 1991 as assistant athletics director, advancing to associate athletics director. He joined the administration at Eastern Kentucky University in 1999, rising to the position of director of athletics in 2001. He has served as director of athletics at Morehead State since August 2002.

Smith is married to the former Gale Thompson, who swam collegiately at North Carolina. They have two children; daughter Chesley (23), who is a 2009 graduate of UNC Greensboro, and a son, Cort (19), who graduated from Smoky Mountain High School.

RAMSEY CENTER

Western Carolina volleyball plays its home matches in the Liston B. Ramsey Regional Activity Center, marking the eighth consecutive season. The Catamounts have compiled a 51-24 (.680) record in the facility.

In the fall of 2002, the volleyball program became the beneficiaries of the newly renovated Catamount Athletic Center — formerly the Camp Lab Gym — which features new locker rooms, office space and a practice area for the volleyball team.

The Catamount volleyball program's previous permanent home was Reid Gymnasium. Western owns an all-time record of 113-63 (.642) in Reid Gym.

The Catamount men's and women's basketball teams have played in the Ramsey Center for the past 16 seasons. The Lady Catamounts played the first official basketball game in the facility when they hosted Mars Hill College on December 4, 1986. The facility's inaugural

men's/women's doubleheader followed two days later, December 6, when WCU's women hosted Coastal Carolina before the men's team hosted North Carolina State. The event attracted a standing-room-only crowd of 8,114.

The fundamental purpose of the Ramsey Regional Activity Center is to provide an efficiently operated and well-equipped public assembly facility for the University and its regional constituencies. The Ramsey Center serves as a resource for developing and producing events produced by others. Its objective is to enrich educational, cultural, entertainment and recreational opportunities for students, faculty and staff of the University, and for the people of the western region of the State.

The Ramsey Center is a unit of the Division of Student Affairs, reporting to the Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs. The Center provides administrative support and logistical planning (promotion, ticketing, staffing, technical operations) which ensures that each activity is conducted in a professional manner. By so doing, the Ramsey Center enhances the image of Western Carolina University, broadens public awareness of the institution, and enriches the quality of life in western North Carolina. This attention to service and quality ensures that the Ramsey Center contributes to the service mission of the University.

The Ramsey Center was completed in April of 1986 and is the largest facility of its type west of Charlotte, N.C. It contains 205,000 square feet of usable space and was built at a cost of \$16.3 million and can seat up to 8,556 for major concerts..

In addition to housing the athletics department's administrative offices, coaches' offices, team locker rooms and meeting facilities, it also contains an auxiliary gymnasium, handball and racquetball courts, a communications center, a firing range and weight rooms. An outdoor ice rink is also part of the facility.

During its first 11 years of operation, nearly 1.5 million people attended activities in the facility. The past several years have demonstrated the facility's flexibility as it has hosted a rodeo, a Monster Truck Jam, numerous theatrical performances, a Broadway musical, graduation ceremo-



acts as Jars of Clay, Blessed Union of Souls, Tracy Byrd, Terri Clark, Aerosmith, Tim McGraw and the Allman Brothers Band while providing WCU's men's and women's basketball and volleyball teams since the 1999 season with practice facilities. The facility also holds summer camps for all three sports.

The facility was named for Liston B. Ramsey, former

The facility was named for Liston B. Ramsey, former Speaker of the North Carolina House of Representatives and longtime representative of the 52nd House District that included Haywood, Madison, Swain, Graham, and Jackson counties.

The Southern Conference, which began its 89th season of intercollegiate competition in 2009, is a national leader in emphasizing the development of the student-athlete and in helping to build lifelong leaders and role models.

The Southern Conference has been on the forefront of innovation and originality in developing creative solutions to address issues facing intercollegiate athletics. From establishing the first conference basketball tournament (1921), tackling the issue of freshmen eligibility (1922), developing women's championships (1984), to becoming the first conference to install the three-point goal in basketball (1980), the Southern Conference has been a pioneer.

The Southern Conference is the nation's fifth-oldest NCAA Division I collegiate athletic association. Only the Big Ten (1896), the Missouri Valley (1907), the Pacific 10 (1915) and the Southwestern Athletic (1920) conferences are older in terms of origination.

Academic excellence has been a major part of the Southern Conference's tradition. Hundreds of Southern Conference student-athletes have been recognized on ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America and all-district teams. A total of 19 Rhodes Scholarship winners have been selected from conference institutions.

The Conference currently consists of 12 members in five states throughout the Southeast and sponsors 19 varsity sports and championships that produce participants for NCAA Division I Championships.

The Southern Conference offices are located in the historic Beaumont Mill in Spartanburg, S.C. A textile mill that was in operation from 1880 until 1999, Beaumont Mill was renovated in 2004 and today offers the league first class meeting areas and offices as well as a spacious library for storage of the conference's historical documents.

MEMBERSHIP HISTORY

On Feb. 25, 1921, representatives from 14 of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association's (SIAA) 30 members met at Atlanta's Piedmont Hotel to establish the Southern Intercollegiate Conference. On hand at the inaugural meeting were officials from Alabama, Alabama Polytechnic Institute (Auburn), Clemson, Georgia, Georgia School of Technology (Georgia Tech), Kentucky, Maryland, Mississippi A&M (Mississippi State), North Carolina, North Carolina State, Tennessee, Virginia, Virginia Polytechnic Institute (Virginia Tech) and Washington & Lee.

Dr. S.V. Sanford of Georgia was chosen as acting chairman and N.W. Dougherty of Tennessee was named secretary. The decision to form a new athletic conference was motivated by the desire to have a workable number of conference games for each league member. With 30 schools in the SIAA by the early 1920s, it was impossible to play every school at least once during the regular season and many schools went several years between playing some conference members. In addition, in 1920, the SIAA voted down proposed rules that an athlete must be in a college a year before playing on its teams and refused to abolish a rule permitting athletes to play summer baseball for money.

Play began in the fall of 1921 and a year later, six more schools joined the fledgling league including Tulane (which had attended the inaugural meeting but had elected not to join), Florida, Louisiana (LSU), Mississippi, South Carolina and Vanderbilt. VMI joined in 1925 and Duke was added in 1929.

By the 1930s, membership in the Southern Conference had reached 23 schools. C.P. "Sally" Miles of Virginia Tech, president of the Southern Conference, called the annual league meeting to order on Dec. 9, 1932 at the Farragut Hotel in Knoxville, Tenn. Georgia's Dr. Sanford announced that 13 institutions west and south of the Appalachian Mountains were reorganizing as the Southeastern Conference. Members of the new league included Alabama, Alabama Polytechnic Institute, Florida, Georgia, Georgia School of Technology, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Mississippi A&M, University of the South, Tennessee, Tulane and Vanderbilt.

According to the minutes of the meeting, Dr. Sanford stated that the division was made along geographical lines. Florida's Dr. J.J. Tigert, acting as spokesman for the withdrawing group, regretted the move but believed it was necessary as the Southern Conference had grown too large. The resignations were accepted and the withdrawing schools formed the new league which began play in 1932.

The Southern Conference continued with membership of 10 institutions including Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina, Virginia, VMI, Virginia Tech and Washington & Lee.

The second major shift occurred some 20 years later. By 1952, the Southern Conference included 17 colleges and universities. Another split occurred when seven schools including Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest departed to form the Atlantic Coast Conference which began play in 1953. The revamped Southern Conference included members The Citadel, Davidson, Furman, George Washington, Richmond, VMI, Virginia Tech, Washington & Lee, West Virginia and William & Mary.

Today, the league continues to thrive with a membership that includes 12 institutions and a footprint that spans five states: Tennessee, North Carolina, South Carolina, Alabama and Georgia. Current league members are Appalachian State, College of Charleston, The Citadel, Davidson, Elon, Furman, Georgia Southern, UNC Greensboro, Samford, Chattanooga, Western Carolina and Wofford.

WESTERN CAROLINA UNIVERSITY ... A HOME OF TRUE STUDENT-ATHLETES

Western Carolina University is committed to helping its student-athletes both on and off the playing field. WCU treasures its outstanding academic reputation and is equally proud of the tradition of its athletic teams. Realizing the important role that sport plays in the lives of our student-athletes, the Office of Academic Support Services for Student-Athletes, in conjunction with the Office of Academic Advising assist student-athletes with managing their athletic demands without sacrificing their academic careers. WCU Department of Athletics has always understood the primacy of academics and maintains a close working relationship with both offices of academic support.

The Office of Academic Support Services for Student-Athletes reports to the Athletic Director and is committed to: (1) Ensuring that each student-athlete at WCU continues to make academic progress towards graduation as well as maintaining athletic eligibility; (2) Ensuring that every student-athlete be provided the necessary resources needed to be academically successful; (3) Striving to assist each student-athlete with reaching their fullest potential as young adults in achieving their career and life goals. The Academic Support Services staff is responsible for monitoring the academic progress and class attendance of all student-athletes and coordinating the Academic Enhancement Program.

The Academic Enhancement Program (AEP) offers academic resources to its student-athletes to give them the best opportunity for continued success in the classroom. All first semester freshmen and transfers and are required to participate in the program. Catamount student-athletes are provided with tutorial services and educational and career workshops.

In conjunction with AEP, the Catamount football team also employs the Academic Game Plan (AGP), which includes each first-year, and all at risk football student-athletes. The program includes organizing daily activities such as reading, tests and quizzes into a notebook that aids in managing time and prioritizing academic responsibilities. In addition, coaches, serving as mentors, hold detailed, hour-long meetings with the student-athletes included in AGP on a daily basis to monitor progress and to stay involved.


The Office of Academic Advising is part of a larger academic support program known as the Office of Advising and Retention Services which has a fundamental responsibility for enhancing the educational experience for all students.

All freshmen student-athletes are advised by a specific academic advisor through enrollment in USI 130, Academic and Career Planning, a one-hour elective course. Through this course, students learn about WCU academic programs and policies, NCAA academic regulations, gain a better understanding of the meaning of higher education, learn more about themselves, and make new friends. All student-athletes are advised by the athletic advisor until they formally declare a major.

Exemplifying their commitment to a cademic excellence and emphasis across the department is apparent in the increasing number of student-athletes recognized for scholastic merit. For

the 2004-05 year, 112 WCU student-athletes qualified for the Southern Conference Academic Honor Roll, which honors student-athletes who have participated in at least one sport and have earned a 3.0 or better grade point average during the past academic year. In 2007-08, a school-record 143 Western Carolina student-athletes were named to the SoCon Academic Honor Roll. WCU also possessed four student-athletes who posted a 4.0 grade point average for the entire school year.

In 2008-09, between the three seasons in which academic accolades are handed out by the SoCon office — fall, winter and spring — Western Carolina boasted a league-high 80 Academic All-Conference team selections including 24 in the fall, 23 in the winter and 33 this spring. Back in 2007-08, WCU led the conference with 81 student-athletes recognized across the three seasons — 25 in the fall, 22 in the winter and 34 in the Spring. Western also had a conference-leading 11 SoCon Student-Athlete of the Week honors a year ago.

Since 2000, Western has produced five Academic All-America selections including Ryan Schade (baseball in 2002); Jason Whaley (football in 2003); Yoneko Allen (women's basketball in 2004); Tyler Sexton (baseball in 2006, '07); and Brooke Johnson (women's basketball in 2008, '09). Whaley was also the recipient of an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship from the National Football Foundation. During that same span, a trio of Catamounts (Allen, Emre Atsur, and Rans

Brempong) have been recipients of the Southern Conference's Mike Wood Postgraduate Scholarship, while track athlete Tonya Edmunds was one of 32 NCAA student-athletes to be awarded a postgraduate scholarship through its Ethnic Minority and Women's Enhancement Postgraduate Scholarship Programs for 2005-06. In 2006, Emily Pierce (women's soccer) was awarded the SoCon's David Knight Graduate Scholarship and the WCU soccer team was recognized by the NCAA as the team ranked among the sport's top 10 percent in Academic Progress Rate (APR).

Off the field for the 2008-09 academic year, in addition to accumulating 3,800 hours of community service, Catamount student-

athletes posted a cumulative Grade Point Average (GPA) of 3.01 for their careers. Bolstering that GPA were a combined 34, 4.0 GPA's in the Fall of 2008 and Spring of 2009 semesters and a combined total of 202 Dean's List honors between the two semesters.
